Sleepy joined the Army National Guard after the recruiter came by Dora High School where he attended in 1976. By the end of the year, he graduated basic training in Fort Lee, Virginia.

Sleepy and Emily met at Elmore's. He transferred from the Clanton store to the Montgomery location to be the Asst. Manager where Emily already worked. She thought he was in his 30's (an old man), he was only 20. It only took about a month for them to start dating and seven months later they were engaged. By November 1978 they were married.

Sleepy got his name because he could sleep anywhere anytime, you name it, including formation with his eyes open. Most people didn't know a Steve Phillips but everyone knew who Sleepy was. He was known across the country by other units and local businesses who he helped support.

As a member of the 20th Special Forces, he loved jumping from planes as long as he didn't have to pull his own chute. He loved the views on his way down. He served 36 years before retiring in 2012 as a Sgt. First Class then became a Civilian Contractor in the units Property Books Office. He received numerous awards and achievements during his service.

He loved traveling and seeing the world. He has been to Italy, Spain, Germany, Puerto Rico, Honduras, Panama, Afghanistan, Iraq, Turkey, Kazakhstan and probably most of the United States. Out of all the places he visited, Montana was his favorite. He talked about how beautiful it is up there and how he would love to live there if he ever moved up North. He took his family to Glacier National Park on a trip in 2005 and they've wanted to go back ever since.

He drove way too fast and scared all his passengers. Family,

Friends, it didn't matter. Whether it was 120mph down the Continental Divide, pretending to be asleep while driving a bus full of guys on impossibly tight roads or driving his wife around the back roads of Walker County, everyone was glad when they made it to their destination in one piece. He finally slowed down when he got mid-way into his forties. Then he didn't mind taking his time getting places.

He drove everyone crazy at one point or another, most times more often than not. He had his way of doing things and he let you know if it wasn't the way he thought was best. He always had a bigger picture in mind for you to achieve that we couldn't always see. Ultimately, he just wanted things to be done the right way, not necessarily the easiest way.

He was a lover of Westerns, War movies, Oldies, Bluegrass, exploring historical towns, driving through the countryside for hours. Cookies, Fruit cake, "Snacky-crackies-with-raisin-pits", Mtn. Dew, Blue Jean Jackets, and Jeeps.

He loved making his own words up to songs just to be silly or singing Airborne Jump songs to his little girls. As they got older, he enjoyed waking them up early in the morning to "Roll Out the Barrel" while singing off key. They still aren't morning people and don't care for that song.

He had a love of Jeeps and camping he passed down to his daughters. He made sure they spent time outside, learned how to set up a tent, sent them through Girl Scouts which he was a card-carrying member himself, taught them how to defend themselves, taught them to drive manual jeeps because "you don't drive an automatic, it drives you." Taught them how to work on their own Jeeps, to be self-sufficient, and not be afraid to try something new.

He loved his family and his friends and his country with all his heart. He proudly served them all and would do it all again if he could.
